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Rules & Regulations of the Lombardy Agricultural Society:

- a) All exhibits must be bonafide productions and the property of the exhibitor. Any infringement of this rule will result in the loss of prizes awarded by the Judges.
- b) No prizes shall be given for a farm or a dairy product that is not the growth and produce of the exhibitor or a member of the exhibitor's family during the present year and only one entry should be made of each kind.
- c) The Judge shall have the power to refuse an award to any article or animal not considered worthy.
- d) Any person making known to the Judge any article or animal that he/she has on exhibit shall forfeit any prize he/she may otherwise be entitled to.
- e) Any person or Exhibitor who shall interfere with the Judges or Directors while performing their duties or use contemptuous or abusive language to any Directors or Judges in consequence of any award made to him, her, or them, shall forfeit his or her rights to any premiums to which he or she would be entitled. They may be prohibited from exhibiting for one year or more This also applies to damage of Society property.
- f) The Board of Directors or a majority of the Board of Directors shall have the power to settle and decide all disputes that may arise among members of the Society in a matter connected therein and decisions of the Board shall be final.
- g) Persons may become members of the Lombardy Agricultural Society by paying to the Treasurer the sum of five dollars (\$5.00). This membership allows the person to vote on all matters concerning the operations of the Society except for voting at the Election of Officers or holding office, the person must have been a member in good standing for ONE FULL YEAR.
- h) **A Membership fee of five dollars (\$5.00) shall be withheld from the prize money of each and every exhibitor winning ten dollars (\$10.00) and over and shall be placed to the credit of the Society for the following year.** The membership for the following year allows the person to vote on matters concerning the operations of the Society.
- i) All entries in Flora Culture, Field Crops, Wine, Wood Working, Garden Produce, School Work and Junior Work and all sections of the Homecraft Division **MUST** be in the display building by 9:00 PM on Thursday evening prior to the Fair and remain on display until the Monday morning on the last day of the fair.
- j) Separate items must be entered for the Special Prize Section in the grain, field crops, garden produce, junior work and all sections of the Homecraft Divisions.

- k) **The Directors shall take every precaution to ensure the safety of the articles exhibited, yet they wish it to be distinctly understood that the owner must take the risk of exhibiting them, and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards recovery of the same, but will not make any payment for the value thereof.**
- l) Any exhibitor using any falsehood or misrepresentation in relation to the article or animal exhibited shall forfeit all rights to the Society during the year which such falsehood or misrepresentation occurred.
- m) In any class with only one exhibitor, the Board reserves the right to pay only half of the designated prize money.
- n) Exhibits, merchandise, prizes and/or gift certificates are to be picked up from the Fair on the Monday between 9am and 11am. Specials not picked up within two weeks of the Fair closing will become the property of the Society.
- o) Any protest **MUST** be filed in writing to the secretary within six (6) days of the Fair. Protests **MUST** give definite and precise grounds. The Board of Directors will decide on all cases and their decision will be final. Any party making a protest must make a deposit of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) as a guarantee of good faith. Such deposit will be refunded upon proving the protest but otherwise will be retained by the Society and added to the funds of the Society.
- p) In the event there should be insufficient funds to pay the Premium list in full, the Society may pay same on prorated basis except that all sponsored classes will be paid in full.
- q) The Society does not assume any responsibility for any exhibitor errors on content. (copyright infringement)
- r) The Society does not assume any responsibility or liability for any accident, damage, loss or theft which might occur before, during or after the Fair.
- s) **Each Livestock exhibitor must send a photocopy of Liability insurance with the entry forms prior to the Fair.**
- t) The Lombardy Agricultural Society reserves the right to close any concessions deemed in violation of any laws and/or regulations or deemed to be inappropriate for the Fair.
- u) The Board of Directors reserves the right to interpret the above rules and regulations.
- v) The Board of Directors reserves the right to correct any errors in the prize list.
- w) Privacy Policy: Any information collected by the Lombardy Agricultural Society regarding members, exhibitors, sponsors, directors and any other persons including photographs related directly to the business of the Society will be solely used for the purposes of promotion of the Lombardy

Agricultural Society and the Lombardy Fair for processing payment of prize monies and other payments owed; for publication of the winner's names in local papers; and for maintenance of their files and data base. Any member, exhibitor, commercial exhibitor, sponsor, or director realizes that when they agree to take part in the Lombardy Fair their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

- d) All exhibits must be in place between 6 & 9 pm the Thursday before the fair opens.
- e) For hay classes, the flake of hay should be in a plastic bag supplied by the Fair.
- f) All grain exhibits should be displayed in plastic bags supplied by the Fair.

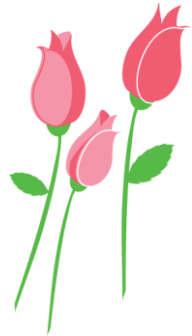
***** Section R- Floral Culture *****

Chairperson: Judy Kelly

Judging: The Friday morning of the Fair

Rules:

- a) Entry Fee is 10% of prize money
- b) All entries must be received from 6 – 9 pm the Thursday prior to the Fair opening and be picked up Monday morning from 9am to 11am.
- c) All exhibits are open to amateur gardeners only.
- d) All plants must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for a minimum of three months to qualify as having been grown by the exhibitor.
- e) Do not use containers of value, as the Fair Board cannot be responsible for loss of containers.
- f) The use of Loosestrife is prohibited.
- g) All rules of the fair shall apply.



Hints for exhibitors:

- All exhibits should be attractively arranged.
- Use sturdy containers for tall flowers (i.e. Gladiolas, Phlox).
- No pot should exceed 12” unless otherwise stated.
- Flowers to be shown with foliage wherever possible as points are given for foliage on the flower exhibited.
- Flowers should be as uniform as possible.
- Make sure to measure the diameter or height of the exhibit. (i.e. Blooms where applicable)
- The exhibit should contain the exact number of stems, blooms, flowers, or leaves specified.
- Grooming makes for a more attractive exhibit. Removal of wilted petals, chewed leaves, debris on or in the pot, pollen, or dust is advised.

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- Do not leave seed heads on the exhibit.
- For taller stems and larger containers cedar may be used to hold the stems in place. The cedar used as a filler must not show above the container level.
- A bloom is an individual flower; one per stem.
- A stem is a plant structure carrying one or more flowers and or buds. If a bud is not open and not showing any colour it does not count as a bloom and it is a good idea to remove it.
- A spray is a portion of plant with numerous flowers.

Read carefully the requirements for each class: i.e. if a specimen is to be 3 inches and under, it is advisable to measure the blooms; try to exhibit blooms of the same size.

NB: Accessories may be used in Classes as stated in the class description.

In the case of very tall flowers you may use stones, cedar, etc. but it must not show above the container level.

Class Description

- 1) Sedum – 3 stalks, 3 different varieties, one of each variety - not to exceed 18” including the vase.
- 2) Phlox - 3 stems, - shades of purple.
- 3) Hosta Leaves - 3 different varieties, 1 stems of each variety.
- 4) Grasses - 3 stems, 3 different varieties – 1 stem of each variety.
- 5) Cosmos - 3 stems, any variety.
- 6) Purple Coneflower (Echinacea) - 3 stems.
- 7) Marigold - 3 stems, blooms to measure 2” and under.
- 8) Marigold - 3 stems, blooms to measure over 2”.
- 9) Pansy or viola - 3 stems.
- 10) Petunia - single, 3 stems.
- 11) Petunia - double, 3 stems.
- 12) Phlox - 3 stems – pink shades.
- 13) Geranium - 3 stems.



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- 14) Echinacea (Coneflower) - 3 stems, any colour other than purple.
- 15) Rudbeckia - 3 stems, any colour, any variety.
- 16) Roses – one spray of roses.
- 17) Snapdragon - 3 spikes.
- 18) Zinnia - 3 stems – small 2” and under.
- 19) Zinnia - 3 stems – 2” and over.
- 20) Single perennial – any specimen not mentioned – must be labelled.
- 21) Double annual – any specimen not mentioned – must be labelled
- 22) Coleus – single pot, at least 3 varieties as grown in pot.
- 23) Begonia – any variety as grown in pot.
- 24) Hanging Flowering Basket – at least 3 varieties as grown in pot.
- 25) A house plant – named as grown in a pot.
- 26) Geranium – single plant in bloom, any variety as grown in pot.
- 27) Impatient plant any variety in pot.

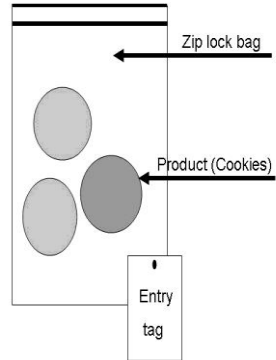

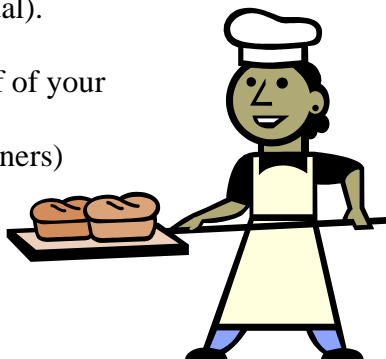

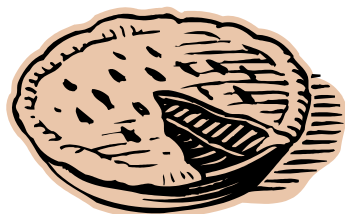

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SPECIALS

27) Loaf of Artisan Bread.

Recipe:

3 cups all purpose flour 1 tsp. salt
½ tsp. yeast 1 ½ cups warm water

NOTE: *Can add other ingredients such as herbs, dried fruit, cheese, dried herbs, or seeds.*

Instructions:

In a bowl, stir the flour, salt, yeast, & any other ingredients you are using. Add water until combined. Cover with plastic wrap and rest at room temperature for 8 – 16 hours or until doubled. Turn dough onto well floured surface and form a ball. Rest for 30 minutes. Mean while place in oven safe baking dish with high sides. (eg. dutch oven) Into the oven and pre heat to 450°F. Slash an “x” on top of the bread. Carefully transfer to baking dish and cover. Bake covered for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake for 15 more minutes until golden brown. Cool before slicing.

28) Lemon Squares.

As per recipe:

Crust:

1 cup butter softened
1 ½ cups icing sugar
2 cups flour
¼ tsp. salt

Filling:

1 ¾ cups sugar
4 eggs
6 tbsp. lemon juice
5 tbsp. flour
½ tsp. baking powder

Crust: Mix together butter, icing sugar, flour, & salt. Press into bottom of a 9 x 13 inch baking dish. Bake at 350°F for 15 minutes.

Filling: Mix sugar, eggs, lemon juice, flour, & baking powder together well. Pour over baked crust and bake for an additional 20 - 25 minutes.



29) Applesauce Cake – 1 large slice.

As per following recipe:

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1/2 cup butter	1 ½ tsp. baking soda
1 ½ cups sugar	½ tsp. salt
1 ½ cups applesauce	2 tsp. cinnamon
2 eggs	½ tsp. nutmeg
2 cups flour	½ cup raisins

Cream butter add sugar gradually and beat well. Add applesauce and blend. Beat in eggs, mix thoroughly. Mix together flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg and add to first mixture. Beat until mixed. Stir in raisins. Bake in 9 x 13 pan at 350°F for 35 – 40 minutes.

- 32) 3 Pieces Maple Fudge.

As per following recipe:

¼ cup maple syrup	4 cups brown sugar
2 tbsp. flour	2 tsp. baking powder
Dash of salt	2 tbsp. butter
1 cup Carnation milk	

Mix maple syrup, brown sugar, flour, baking powder, salt, & butter in saucepan. Add milk and heat slowly until it comes to a boil. Use a candy thermometer and cook until soft ball stage, about 234° F (112 °C). Beat by hand using a wooden spoon if possible, until it gives a creamy thick texture. Pour into a well buttered 8” X 8” pan. Cool. Cut into squares.
